OVERVIEW

 This scale assesses the level of tolerance and acceptance that youth have for differences of ethic and cultural diversity in people different than oneself

SUBSCALES

- None
- Sample items from the scale:
 - It would bother me to work for a person whose skin color is different from mine
 - I don't think I could be close friends with a disabled person
 - If a friend whose ideas about God are very different from mine gave me a religious magazine to read, I wouldn't read it

THEME(S)

- Diversity, Social Inclusion & Safety
 - -Youth experience social inclusion and value diversity

TARGET POPULATION

- Youth between 10 and 17 years of age
 - Separate scales for ages 10-11 (Grades 5-6), 14
 (Grade 8) and 17 (Grade 11)

LENGTH & HOW IT IS MEASURED

- 5th grade scale: 10 items
- 8th grade scale: 9 items
- 11th grade scale: 11 items
- Response scale ranges from 1 (agree strongly) to 4 (disagree strongly)
- Self-report, paper-pencil version
- Negatively-worded items need to be reverse coded
- Add the item scores together to get a total score;
 higher scores reflect greater tolerance (highest possible score = 40)
- Available in: English
