Belonging Uncertainty Scale

This scale measures an individual's sense of belonging and worry that they do not fit into a certain group or setting.

SUBSCALES

- Social Acceptance
- Identity
- Validation

R TARGET POPULATION

Children, youth, and adults.

LENGTH & HOW IT IS MEASURED

- 3 questions.
- Items are measured on a 7-point scale:
 1 = strongly disagree; 2 = disagree;
 3 = moderately disagree; 4 = neutral;
 - 5 = moderately agree; 6 = agree;
 - 7 = strongly agree.
- Self-reported, paper-pencil version or electronic, <u>available online</u>.
- Available in English.
- To calculate each participant's total score, add up their responses to all items and divide the total by the number of items to get the average rating.
